

# Right Of Access To Thesis

1. I give permission for my thesis to be copied by the Library for purposes of preservation and : (strike out the options not elected)

(b) I note that under section 51 (2) of the Copyright Act 1968 (see page 2) the Librarian may make a copy of the thesis for the purposes of research or private study. I ask, however, that the Librarian obtain the approval of the appropriate Head of School before either copying the thesis or making the thesis available. This restriction is to apply for ..... months unless I otherwise agree, and thereafter the thesis may be freely available as in (a) above.

(c) I request that the thesis be totally withheld from any use whatsoever for ..... years from this date, but I agree that a Committee consisting of the Librarian, the Chair of the Academic Senate or her/his nominee, and the appropriate Head of School may, upon request, and after consultation with me (if in the Committee's opinion I am reasonably available) make the thesis available for research or private study, not including copying, to such extent and upon such conditions as the Committee thinks fit.

2. As a condition of submitting her/his thesis for examination a candidate shall grant or assign the University a licence to publish her/his thesis (in whole or part) should it not otherwise have been published after a period of 10 years from the award of the degree.

# Right of Access to Thesis

Under the Copyright Act, 1968 (Section 51 (2)) the Librarian has the right to copy theses under the conditions set out in that provision. However, the University has the right to restrict access to theses held by the University Library and is prepared to allow the author of a thesis to restrict access to the thesis for certain purposes.

## ADVICE TO AUTHORS

### 1. Option (a)

This option makes a thesis freely available for all purposes including copying. *It is expected that most authors will elect this option, as normally there is no reason to restrict access to a thesis.* The thesis will be catalogued and shelved in the general collection. It will also be added to the Australian Digital Thesis site.

### 2. Option (b)

Under this option the thesis is available for private study or research but reasonable protection is provided for confidential information. It is the responsibility of persons wishing to have access to the thesis for purposes other than research or private study to consult the author. The thesis will be catalogued, and located in the Resources Management section.

### 3. Option (c)

*Authors should elect this option only in extreme cases.* This option prevents any use of a thesis except that the University may make the thesis available for private study or research if the Committee mentioned in the option considers the restriction too extreme. Where possible the author of a thesis will be consulted when an application has been made to vary the restriction. The thesis will remain uncatalogued and located in the Resources Management section.

## Section 51 (2) Copyright Act 1968 (as amended by s11 of the 1980 Act)

“Where a manuscript, or a copy, of a thesis or other similar literary that has not been published is kept in a library of a university or other similar institution or in an archives, the copyright in the thesis or other work is not infringed by the making of a copy of the thesis or other work by or on behalf of the officer in charge of the library or archives if the copy is supplied to a person who satisfies an authorized officer of the library or archives that he requires the copy for the purpose of research or study.”
